
Unto the worthy populace of Bordescros and to all of the friends of the Shire, Greetings.

HISTORIC INSTRUMENTS, COSTUMES AND DANCES

A colourful Renaissance spectacle, unmatched elsewhere in the nation, will be provided by the Early Arts Guild's highlight program for 2012 – *The Dancing Priest of Langres*.

The Rippon Lea Renaissance Dancers, Early Music Consort of Melbourne and vocalist Caitlin Noble will be wearing spectacular period court garments when they perform for *Renaissance Warragul* at Wesley of Warragul in Victoria St., on July 22.

Christ Church in Ford St, *Beechworth*, will play host to the "*Dancing Priest*" on August 26. Brighton Town Hall will be the venue for the final program on September 9.

All presentations will commence at 2.15 p.m. and will

be of one hour duration.

An extensive range of rare 16th century musical instruments will be a feature of these performances, with a splendidly decorated Queen Elizabeth virginal, made by Marc Nobel, being the centrepiece. The virginal was the Queen's main

Also on show will be a number of the fascinating double reed wind instruments of the period. These will include the cornameuse, dulzaine and the strangely curved krummhorn, which was a favourite at the court of King Henry VIII.

keyboard instrument.

The curtal, from which the modern bassoon evolved, will also be heard. Plucked string instruments will be represented by the lute, and bowed types by the fidel - an ancient offshoot of the medieval guitar family.

With such an array of early instruments, *The Dancing Priest of Langres* will be a veritable gold mine for music students. And it will also offer much to history, dance, and drama and period costume enthusiasts.

PREPARE TO WELCOME THE FAMOUS DANCING PRIEST

Fifty years ago the Singing Nuns were much in vogue. But, way back in 1589, it was Jehan Tabourot, a Catholic priest at Langres in France, who made a name for himself by publishing a remarkable dance book.

Unlike the Singing Nuns, who seem to have passed from public view of late, the dance manual, *Orchesography*, has survived for over three centuries to become the starting point for most present-day students of Renaissance Dancing.

It differs from similar publications of the period by including a number of relatively simple country dances – some dating back to the 1530's.

These offer the onlooker such visions of rural life as peas jumping out of the pod, prancing horses, the wearing of clogs and the washing of clothes down by the local stream.

Matching these are more substantial courtly dances, including the Basse Dance, Galliard and Canario.

And then there is the spectacular Sword Dance which is one of the most arresting works in the 16th century dance repertoire.

Two other features give *Orchesography* its special place in dance literature.

Firstly, it uses a simple but effective method of step and movement notation which enables these works to be danced today as in their original form.

This, in turn, lessens the lengthy, and often confusing, descriptions of steps and patterns found in other dance manuals of the time. And it leaves room for the charming dialogue between the dance-master, Thoinot Arbeau, (pseudonym for Jehan Tabourot) and his fictional student, Capriol.

Their celebrated discussion of history, philosophy and the role of women in society give *Orchesography* an endearing quality and provide the reader with a fascinating insight into Renaissance attitudes and lifestyle.

Parts of the sprightly dialogue will be enacted during this semi-theatrical presentation.

The Dancing Priest of Langres is a program that will educate as much as it will entertain. Secondary school teachers, especially, should view the coming performances as a rare opportunity for their students.

HISTORIC BANNER WILL HAVE FIRST EXHIBITION

The coat of arms of the family of Jehan Tabourot will be displayed on a banner being specially made for the coming performances of *The Dancing Priest of Langres*.

Dominique Murphy, a member of the Rippon Lea Renaissance Dancers, is in charge of the research and making of the banner

This will be her third contribution to the Early Arts Guild's growing collection of historic artefacts. The coats of arms of Montserrat in Spain and Frankfurt am Main in Germany appeared on her earlier works.

They were made for performances of the *Llibre Vermell* and for the Städel Exhibition at the National Gallery of Victoria. On this occasion, however, the new banner will be seen in Warragul and Beechworth before any Melbourne display.

Recipes



Tzusanna's Salad Recipe From Junes Feast:

This recipe for <u>kasha</u> with mandarin oranges and raisins is so versatile. It can be a side dish, stuffing for roasted meats like <u>veal</u>, <u>chicken</u>, duck, <u>pork</u> or <u>turkey</u>, as a cold salad with vinaigrette, or a main course with the addition of grilled chicken or salmon.

Kasha -- roasted buckwheat groats -- is a favorite among Russians, Poles and Ukrainians and other Eastern Europeans. It's a winner because of its high fiber content and low glycemic index.

Here's a larger picture of kasha with mandarin oranges.

Makes 6 servings of Kasha with Mandarin Oranges and Raisins

Prep Time: 10 minutes **Cook Time:** 20 minutes **Total Time:** 30 minutes

Ingredients:

- 1 cup uncooked kasha
- 1 large beaten egg
- 4 tablespoons (1/2 stick) butter or margarine
- 1 large chopped onion
- 2 ribs chopped celery
- 2 cups hot chicken or vegetable broth
- 1/4 cup golden raisins
- 1/4 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1 (16-ounce) can mandarin oranges, drained, liquid reserved
- Salt and pepper

Preparation:

- 1. In a small bowl, combine kasha and egg, and set aside. In large skillet, saute onion and celery in butter until translucent and almost tender. Add the kasha-egg mixture and saute just until grains separate.
- 2. Add raisins, ginger and mustard to broth and mix well. Raise the heat to medium-high and add the broth mixture to the skillet. Mix well, bringing to a boil. Cover, reduce heat to low and cook for 15-20 minutes or until the kasha is tender and the liquid has evaporated. Remove from heat and let cool for 10 minutes.
- 3. Add mandarin oranges to kasha mixture and adjust seasonings. Serve warm or cold. Use leftover mandarin orange juice to baste roasted meats or to make a vinaigrette.

- Points are awarded up to 10 for each of documentation, authenticity, creativity/presentation, complexity and workmanship


